Business Items to Consider

4A: Proclamation: Child Abuse Awareness Month

A proclamation recognizing April as Child Abuse Awareness Month, dedicated to raising awareness, promoting prevention, and reaffirming our community's commitment to protecting the safety, well-being, and future of all children.

4B: Proclamation: Fair Housing Month

A proclamation recognizing April as Fair Housing Month, reaffirming our commitment to equal housing opportunities, promoting inclusive communities, and ensuring that all individuals are treated fairly and without discrimination in housing.

RECOMMENDED MOTION: *No motion needed.*

4C: Proclamation: National Lineman Appreciation Day

A proclamation recognizing April 18, 2026 as National Lineman Appreciation Day. This day celebrates the profession of electrical Lineman noting this profession requires passion, dedication and ongoing training throughout. Thank you to Brandon and his crew for all they do for our community.

4D: Presentation: 19th Century Restorations; Derrick Renovation

We have reached out to several companies to evaluate the oil derrick at the Norman No. 1 Museum. One of the first to conduct an on-site assessment was 19th Century Renovations. They have since prepared a presentation outlining their recommendations and proposed approach for addressing the condition of the derrick.

As we move forward, we plan to continue exploring additional options for the repair and restoration of the derrick. Our goal is to gather multiple perspectives and proposals, allowing for a well-informed decision-making process. We anticipate scheduling and reviewing additional presentations from other qualified companies so that we can compare approaches, costs, and timelines before determining the best path forward.

4E: Discuss Donation of Jaw of Life Equipment

The Neodesha Fire Department has a second set of Jaws and extraction equipment that is not currently assigned to a truck. Chief Hubbell has approached us about the possibility of donating this equipment to the Rural Fire District. His intent is to put the equipment back into service while also increasing coverage, giving Wilson County three departments equipped with these resources.

RECOMMENDED MOTION: I move to approve the donation of the Genesis Rescue Tools to the City of Altoona Fire Department.

4F: Discuss Changing Hours of Operations; Pool

We would like to discuss a potential change to the operating hours for the Neodesha Splash Zone. During last year's season, we observed a significant drop in attendance during the final hour of daily operations.

Our current proposal is to shorten regular operating hours while introducing a couple of extended evening days. For example, the pool could close at 5:00 or 5:30 p.m. on most days, with extended hours until 7:00 p.m. on select days such as Wednesdays and Saturdays.

This adjustment could create opportunities for additional party bookings and allow us to explore new dedicated programming, such as adult swim nights.

4G: Request for Use of Riverwalk Park

Miranda Carpenter is requesting permission to utilize Riverwalk Park on June 13th for the purpose of hosting a children's fishing derby. The event is intended to provide a recreational and family-friendly outdoor activity for youth in the community. Approval of this request would allow for the coordination and planning necessary to ensure a safe and successful event at the park.

RECOMMENDED MOTION: I move to approve the use of Riverwalk Park on Saturday, June 13, 2026, from 6:30 to 11:30 a.m. for the purpose of a kid's fishing derby.

The Board of Commissioners met in regular session at 4:00 p.m., on Wednesday, March 25, 2026, in the Commission Room at City Hall with Vice-Mayor Banzet presiding and Commissioner Truelove present. Mayor Johnson was absent from the meeting. The meeting was recorded via Zoom platform.

Commissioner Truelove moved to approve the agenda as presented. Seconded by Vice-Mayor Banzet. Motion carried.

Commissioner Truelove moved to approve the consent agenda as presented consisting of minutes from the March 11, 2026 Meeting; and Appropriation (2026) 05. Seconded by Vice-Mayor Banzet. Motion carried.

Administrator Jones addressed the Commission regarding a resolution that would amend the City's Personnel Policy Manual related to particular items for employees on suspension, adjustment to years of service earning for vacation and amending the amount of meal reimbursement for travel. Discussion held.

RESOLUTION 26-05

A RESOLUTION AMENDING THE PERSONNEL POLICIES FOR THE CITY OF NEODESHA, KANSAS, AS ADOPTED BY THE NEODESHA CITY COMMISSION BY RESOLUTION 18-13.

WHEREAS, K.S.A. 12-101 provides that a city may exercise the powers of home rule in determination of local affairs, and the City of Neodesha is a City of the Second Class as defined by Kansas Statute; and

WHEREAS, the management of the City of Neodesha regarding personnel rules, employee classification plans, compensation and related administrative procedures and policies are a permissible exercise of home rule powers, pursuant to K.S.A. 12-101a; and

WHEREAS, the City of Neodesha Governing Body established personnel policies and rules in the form of a Personnel Policy Manual by the Neodesha City Commission as a policy directive to guide the City Administrator and the employees of the City of Neodesha in their duties as employees of the City consistent with the permissible exercise of home rule powers;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF NEODESHA:

1. That the following amendments be made to the adopted Personnel Policy Manual Section 7.1 Group Medical Insurance; add item d. and e.; and modify numbers to follow down in succession:

7.1 Group Medical Insurance

The City offers to all full-time employees and all eligible dependents group medical insurance. Full-time employees will become eligible for the group medical insurance on the first day of the month following their initial date of employment. A part-time employee shall be eligible for group medical insurance care on the first day of the first full month following their change in employment status from part-time to full-time. Specific plans are described in insurance brochures provided to each new employee by the Payroll Clerk.

- a. When an employee is required to contribute a portion of medical insurance premium cost that amount will be accomplished through payroll deduction.
- b. The Governing Body shall make the final decision regarding the selection of a health insurance provider, the coverage to be provided and the portion of premium cost to be paid by the City.
- c. All costs for health care insurances available through the City shall be paid by the employee during any period the employee is on leave without pay, is on suspension without pay, is on unauthorized leave, or participating in any unlawful work stoppage.
- d. All required insurance premiums shall be due and payable on the first (1) day of the month following the commencement of such suspension or leave.
- e. In the event the suspension extends beyond a period of three (3) months, the City reserves the right to review the employee's status and determine appropriate action, including but not limited to continuation or termination of employment.
- f. Health care insurance coverage shall be extended to an individual who is temporarily disabled and receiving workers compensation while serving as a city employee. The employee's share of cost shall be paid to the city as a direct payment by the employee or otherwise deducted from any city compensation payments. In the event no payment is received from the employee's share of insurance cost, the option to cancel the insurance remains with the City.
- g. No regular full-time or part-time employee shall be entitled to cash payment in lieu of health care insurance coverage.
- h. The City complies with those provisions of the Federal Consolidated Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1986 (COBRA) as it relates to the availability of group health insurance coverage upon termination of City employment.

2. That the following amendments be made to the adopted Personnel Policy Manual Section 8.3 Vacation Leave; modifying

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accrued years eligibility to advance to next level of accrual; and the addition of Section 8.12 Leave Accrual while Suspended:

8.3 Vacation Leave - Current

Years of Continuous Service	1-9	10-14	15-19	20-24	25+
Hours per Year (maximum)	96	120	160	200	240

8.12 Leave Accrual While Suspended

An employee who is suspended, whether with pay or without pay, shall not accrue service-time benefits, including vacation, sick leave, or personal time, during the period of suspension. Insurance benefits must continue to be paid by the employee during such suspension, as outlined in Section 7.1 of this policy manual.

- That the following amendments be made to the adopted Personnel Policy Manual Section 9.2; modifying the meal allowance amount to reflect \$80 per day:

9.2 Travel and Training Reimbursements

- Meals:** In order for meals not to be counted as a taxable benefit, traveling away from home must include an overnight stay or be long enough to require substantial sleep or rest. Per the IRS, meals are considered fringe benefits on same day trips unless the employee is being sent to training for the edification of their current job position and the training is being held by either a nonprofit or Government Entity. Meal allowance shall be no more than \$80.00 per day and may not include alcoholic beverages. The City does not reimburse expenses for snacks or drinks while traveling. In rare occasions, depending upon the venue of the trip, the City Administrator may approve a higher allowance if needed.

Commissioner Truelove moved to approve Resolution 26-05 as presented. Seconded by Vice-Mayor Banzet. Motion carried.

Administrator Jones addressed the Commission regarding a resolution that addresses setting a public hearing for the Dangerous Structure yard abatement for the property located at 114 S 9th. Discussion held.

RESOLUTION NO. 26-06

A RESOLUTION FIXING A TIME AND PLACE AND PROVIDING FOR NOTICE OF A HEARING BEFORE THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF NEODESHA, KANSAS AT WHICH TIME THE OWNER, HIS AGENT, LIENHOLDERS OF RECORD AND OCCUPANTS OF THE STRUCTURE LOCATED AT 114 South 9th Street, LEGAL DESCRIPTION: North half (N/2) of the East Half (E/2) of Lots Twenty-three (23) and Twenty-four (24), Block Forty-three (43), in the city of Neodesha

MAY APPEAR AND SHOW CAUSE WHY SUCH PROPERTY SHOULD NOT BE CONSIDERED UNSAFE OR CAUSING A BLIGHTING INFLUENCE AND DIRECTING THE VIOLATION TO BE ABATED OR REMOVED AND THE PREMISES MADE SAFE AND SECURE.

WHEREAS, the Enforcement Officer of the City of Neodesha, did on the 19th day of February, 2026, file on behalf of the Governing Body of said City a statement in writing that the property was found to be unsafe and/or causing a blighting influence;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Governing body of the City of Neodesha that a hearing will be held on the 13th day of May, 2026, before the Governing Body of the City at 2:00 p.m. in the Commission Room of City Hall, 1407 N. 8th; at which time the owner, his agent, any lien holder of record and any occupant of the structure located at 114 South 9th Street may appear and show cause why such property should not be considered a blighting influence and/or an unsafe property and be ordered to abate the property and be made safe and secure.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City Clerk shall cause this Resolution to be published two consecutive times and shall give notice of the aforesaid hearing in the manner provided by law.

Commissioner Truelove moved to approve Resolution 26-06 as presented, setting a public hearing for May 13, 2026 at 4:00 p.m. Seconded by Vice-Mayor Banzet. Motion carried.

Administrator Jones addressed the Commission regarding the consideration of bids for the demolition of the properties located at 127 Mill and 1011 Carolina Streets. The bid opening was conducted on March 23, 2026. Discussion held.

Commissioner Truelove moved to accept the bid for the demolition of 127 Mill by Recrete Design in the amount of \$12,000. Seconded by Vice-Mayor Banzet. Motion carried.

Commissioner Truelove moved to accept the bid for the demolition of 1011 Carolina by Rob Dent Excavating in the amount of \$6,000. Seconded by Vice-Mayor Banzet. Motion carried.

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At 4:30 p.m. Commissioner Banzet requested a 15-minute recess. Seconded by Commissioner Truelove. Motion carried. The Zoom recording ended due to technical issues with an unexpected update.

At 4:45 p.m. the regular meeting of the Governing Body reconvened in the Commission Room at City Hall. The second half of the meeting was again recorded via Zoom platform.

Commissioner Truelove moved to recess as the City of Neodesha City Commission and convene as the Neodesha Land Bank. Seconded by Vice-Mayor Banzet. Motion carried.

Administrator Jones addressed the Land Bank Commission regarding an offer to purchase the property located at 1211 N 3rd Street. Discussion held.

Commissioner Truelove moved to approve the sale of the Neodesha Land Bank property located at 1211 N 3rd Street for the amount offered of \$1,000. Seconded by Vice-Mayor Banzet. Motion carried.

Commissioner Truelove moved to adjourn as the Neodesha Land Bank and reconvene as the City of Neodesha City Commission. Seconded by Vice-Mayor Banzet. Motion carried.

Administrator Jones addressed the Commission regarding the purchase of a gas detector for the Public Works Department. Discussion held.

Commissioner Truelove moved to approve the purchase of the GAS-TRAC LZ-30 from Sensit Technologies in an amount not to exceed \$12,800. Seconded by Vice-Mayor Banzet. Motion carried.

Administrator Jones addressed the Commission regarding the City's relationship with Priority Power Management. Discussion held. No action taken.

Public Comments were again invited and heard.

The next regular meeting of the Governing Body will be held at City Hall on Wednesday, April 8, 2026, at 4:00 p.m.

At 5:05 p.m. Commissioner Truelove moved to adjourn. Seconded by Vice-Mayor Banzet. Motion carried.

Whereas, the Fair Housing Act, enacted on April 11, 1968, enshrined into federal law the goal of eliminating racial segregation and ending housing discrimination in the United States; and

Whereas, the Fair Housing Act prohibits discrimination in housing based on race, color, religion, sex, familial status, national origin, and disability, and commits recipients of federal funding to affirmatively further fair housing in their communities; and

Whereas, the City of Neodesha, Kansas is committed to the mission and intent of Congress to provide fair and equal housing opportunities for all; and

Whereas, Our social fabric, the economy, health, and environment are strengthened in diverse communities; and

Whereas, more than fifty years after the passage of the Fair Housing Act, discrimination persists, and many communities remain segregated; and

Whereas, acts of housing discrimination and barriers to equal housing opportunity are repugnant to a common sense of decency and fairness.

Now, therefore, I, Devin Johnson, Mayor of the City of Neodesha, on behalf of its citizens, do hereby proclaim the month of April 2026 as **FAIR HOUSING MONTH** and express the hope that this year's observance will promote fair housing practices throughout the City.

**National Lineman
Appreciation Day
2026**

Whereas, the City of Neodesha celebrates the profession of electrical Lineman, as this profession requires passion, dedication and ongoing training; and

Whereas, electrical Linemen are often first responders during storms, working to repair broken electrical lines to make the area safe for other public safety heroes; and

Whereas, electrical Linemen must work our power lines 24 hours a day, 365 days a year to keep electricity flowing; and they also play a vital role by maintaining and growing the electrical infrastructure; and

Whereas, due to the danger of their work with high voltage, electrical Linemen put their lives at risk every day for the citizens of our community; and

Whereas, the U. S. House of Representatives recognizes the efforts of electrical Linemen in keeping the power on and protecting public safety and has designated the celebration of a National Lineman Appreciation Day.
